

Obituary

Writer-activist James Baldwin once wrote that "People can't, unhappily, invent their mooring posts, their lovers and their friends, any more than they can invent their parents. Life gives these and, also takes them away and the great difficulty is to say 'Yes' to life." Robert Long, Jr. not only said 'Yes' to life, but also served as a brilliant beacon of light — a lighthouse, in fact — to family, friends, loved-ones and associates.

Born in Durham, North Carolina to Robert Long and Frances Bullock Long, Robert Long, Jr., demonstrated an early love of and compassion for the welfare of others. He graduated from Hillside High School (1964) and served valiantly in the U.S. Army as Private First Class, (November 1965 - September 1967), during which time he was the recipient of the National Defense Service Medal, the Vietnam Campaign Medal, and the Vietnam Rifle Expert Service Medal.

On August 7, 1971 he was united in Holy Matrimony to Vicki Rush Long in Pinehurst, North Carolina. To this marriage one son was born, Phillip Ryan Long. He was a loving husband and father, who provided hands-on nurturing to his son.

Robert Long, Jr., earned a BS in Business Administration from North Carolina Central University in May 1976. Soon after, he began a 43-year tenure with the United States Postal Service, where he served numerous capacities (window clerk, supervisor, station manager and interim Postmaster). Perhaps his greatest role within USPS was serving as a mentor and friend to other employees.

Robert was a dedicated member of the Walltown Reunion Committee, serving as its Treasurer for many years, as well as for the Amy E. Kelly Education Foundation.

Robert Long's own experiences as a Black man in an often unkind and unpredictable world lead him to advocate and advise those he loved with a stern command, a gentle warning, and sometimes, simply a knowing look. He understood that while challenges face every person, it is how we face those challenges — with dignity, grace, and (when necessary) a bit of muscle, that ultimately determines our triumphs or failures.

He is survived by his wife, Vicki Rush Long, his son, Phillip Long (Danielle);
